

BRECONSHIRE QUARTER SESSIONS RECORDS

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INTRODUCTION

The list that follows is a preliminary one. Its limitations are mostly such as were imposed by the restricted time that circumstances allowed for the work. 'UNCLASSIFIED' is associated with items that still await numbering and possibly await further classification.

Users are particularly requested to return all bundles exactly as received without addition, loss or interference with the order of documents within the bundle, even where the order appears to be without significance or to be incorrect. Considerable care will be required in reading many of the rolls in their present condition to avoid tearing documents and the danger of their being misplaced once free of the file (string).

This list provides next to no explanatory matter. A most useful companion to it would be 'COUNTY RECORDS' by F G EMMISON and IRVINE GREY (Historical Association pamphlet H62, reprinted 1967). Users, unless they already have experience of working with Quarter Sessions records, are strongly advised to spend a few hours with this booklet before beginning any research. Equally valuable are many of the published guides to the records of individual counties. Those of Essex, Kent and Sussex, among others, have valuable explanatory matter which will help guide the researcher to the classes of records most likely to provide the information he/she is after.

In referring to the four sessions of the year the following abbreviations are used;

- H** **Hilary** (or Epiphany or January or Christmas) session. Occasionally this session fell in December instead of January (hence 'Christmas session'). Such session will, in this list, be given the date of the coming year, e.g. session in December 1900 would be listed as 1901 H.
- E** **Easter** session.
- T** **Trinity** (or July or Midsummer) session.
- M** **Michaelmas** (or October) session.

All dates in the list above are given in New Style. The session roll listed 1730 H will be that for January 1729/30. In the course of the final preparation of this list, one or two possible errors of classification have been noticed. These errors will have to stand for the time being.

The Great Forest of Brecknock was a large tract of upland, interspersed with wooded valleys, which was set aside for game hunting by Bernard of Newmarch, when he assumed the Lordship of Brecon in around 1093. The designation 'forest' did not mean that the area was entirely covered in trees, rather it was an indication that the area was to be used for hunting (mostly deer) by the Lord of the Manor; the land and its inhabitants were also subject to Forest Law. The administration of the Forest within the Lordship was carried out by a Forester, and his staff, the Verderers and Agisters.

Tenants and inhabitants of the Forest, and of the Lordship as a whole, had the right to pasture in the Great Forest on payment of Kyveryve [Cyfrif] – 3d per beast.

By the 15th century, the Lordship of Brecon had passed, through marriages and inheritance, to Henry, Duke of Buckingham. On the latter's attainder in 1483, Richard III confiscated his estates, including the Lordship of Brecon. Richard granted a charter to the commoners of the Great Forest on 19 Feb 1484, reducing the Cyfrif to 1d per beast.

The attainder was reversed by Henry VII, and Edward Duke of Buckingham (son of Henry) regained the Lordship. He was subsequently executed by Henry VIII, and the estates reverted to the Crown again in 1521. An Inspeximus of Richard III's charter was issued by Henry VIII, in 1538, granting the inhabitants of the Lordship of Brecon a right of common in the Great Forest.

The Lordship and the Great Forest were leased out (usually separately) by the Crown. By the 17th century both were held by branches of the Morgan Family of Tredegar. The Great Forest was often 'farmed' or sub let. It was in the interest of the 'Farmers' - also known as Foresters

or Collectors, to raise as much money as they could.

The inhabitants of the Forest grazed their stock, paying per head of cattle, or per 100 in the case of sheep. The residents of the Lordship of Brecon, who lived in those parts of the parishes of Defynnog, Llywel, Cantref, Ystradfellte and Ystradgynlais which were outside the Forest boundary, could also graze stock in the Forest, as could those who lived in other parishes within the manor, but not bordering the Forest, such as Merthyr Cynog and Llanspyddid; these last paid a higher price. The money raised in this way was not sufficient to make the taking of a sub-let profitable, so the Collectors allowed 'foreign' stock (also called 'strangers') from outside the Forest and the Lordship - mostly from Glamorganshire and Carmarthenshire - at a yet higher price.

See B/QS/GF/FR/IM/4 for a good exposition of the economics of 'farming'.

The Collection

The records in this collection separate into three series:

1. A small collection of mostly late 18th century documents relating to the Lordship – the majority to do with the payment of Comortha, a tax or 'aid' paid by landowners within a Lordship to the Lord of the Manor.
2. Documents from the late 18th and early 19th centuries relating to Forestal Rights. The earliest of these are papers from cases where commoners from within the Forest or Lordship have impounded the cattle of 'strangers'. Later papers relate to the case of Watkin Lloyd and David Jones. They had asserted, along with the other commoners, their rights to pasture, in the face of an Act passed in 1808 (48 Geo III, C 73.), allowing the Crown, in need of money because of the war with France, to sell off the Forest. The Crown prosecuted Watkins and Lloyd, as representatives of the commoners, for 'Intrusion, Trespass and contriving the Disinheriton of the Lord the King.' The other commoners shared the defence costs. The Crown withdrew the case, before it could come before the Assize Court in Hereford in 1814, because it was felt that the commoners' case for 'long usage' was so strong.
3. The bulk of the documents in the collection relate to the enclosure of the Great Forest. After the failure of the 1808 Act, it was decided that another bill should be put before Parliament, to allow for the enclosure of the Forest, and its division between the Crown and the commoners. The Crown could then raise money by selling off its allotment. The subsequent Enclosure Act was dated 11 July 1815.

John Cheese of Lyonshall, Herefordshire and Henry de Bruyn, a London solicitor, were appointed Commissioners, with Thomas Bold and John Jones as their Clerks. Their first task was to adjudicate the claims of commoners and the Crown. The expenses incurred resulted in the sale of outlying parts of the Forest, to defray costs. Much of this land was bought by Roland Alder and Archibald Christie. The land

was originally sold tithe free, as it was considered extra-parochial. This decision was later reversed, after representations from the Church, and more land had to be sold to compensate the purchasers, who now had to pay tithes.

The next process was to divide the commoners' allotment between them. When it became obvious that this was going to be too costly in time and money, an amending Bill was brought before parliament on 18 June 1818; the Brecknock Forest Amendment Bill allowed for the commoners allotment to be held by them in severality. It also set out how commoners' allotment should be administered, and allocated the mineral rights to the Crown.

The Award was finally settled in 1819. Of the roughly 40,000 acres of the Great Forest which existed in 1815, 13,767 acres were allotted to the Crown, the commoners receiving 17,106 acres; 8,000 acres had been sold off to pay the costs of the enclosure and around 250 to compensate purchasers who had bought land tithe free. By 1820, the Crown had sold its allotment to James Stewart of London. When he went bankrupt, John Christie, a relation of Archibald, bought it.

Notes

The Enclosure map and award have already been catalogued, with the other Quarter Sessions records, and can be found under catalogue reference B/QS/DE/1.

Many of the documents in the collection are copies, in the case of letter, or drafts of legal documents.

Spellings of parishes and farms have been left as they appear in the document; square brackets are used to give the current correct Welsh spelling, where this is substantially different. References to the Great Forest and the Manor have been standardised to: The Great Forest of Brecknock and the Lordship of Brecon. *Enclosure* has been used throughout, rather than *Inclosure*, except in direct quotation.

There is a glossary, on the next page, of some of the more obscure terms which appear in the catalogue, and some which appear in the documents.

Agistment: **1.** The action or process of agisting; the taking in of cattle or live stock to feed at a rate of so much per head; the opening of a forest for a specified time to live stock. **2.** The herbage of a forest, or the right to it. **3.** The rate levied or profit made upon the pasturing of another's cattle. By extension, Any rate or charge levied upon the owner or occupier of (pasture) lands.

Comortha: an "aid" of small amount, paid, in every alternate year, by the landowners in the member lordships. It was not charged upon those in the body of the County, and appears to have been a purely Welsh custom derived from the times of the early Welsh lords.

Constat: A certificate stating what appears (*constat*) upon record touching a matter, given by the clerk of the pipe and auditors of the Exchequer at the request of a person who intends to plead or move in that court for the discharge of any matter.

Couchant and levant: lying down and rising up; said of cattle in permanent or quasi-permanent occupation of pasture; more commonly *Levant and couchant*. **1768** BLACKSTONE *Comm.* III. 9 If the lands were not sufficiently fenced so as to keep out cattle, the landlord cannot distress them, till they have been levant and couchant (*levantes et cubantes*) on the land; that is, have been long enough there to have laid down and rose up to feed; which in general is held to be one night at least.

Depasturage: **a.** The eating down of pasture by grazing animals. **b.** Right of pasture

Herbage: The natural herbage or pasture of any land as a species of property distinct from the land itself; hence 'a liberty that a man hath to feede his catell in another mans ground, as in the forest.'

In replevin: The restoration to, or recovery by, a person of goods or chattels distrained or taken from him, upon his giving security to have the matter tried in a court of justice and to return the goods if the case is decided against him.

Inspeximus: A charter in which the grantor avouches to have inspected an earlier charter which he recites and confirms.

Pannage: The right or privilege to pasture pigs (or other animals) in a forest; payment made to the owner of a tract of woodland for this right or privilege; the right to collect such payment; the income accruing from this.

Pasturage: The right of pasture

Stinted: Of pasture: Divided into or subject to rights of pasturage; limited to the pasturing of a definite number of cattle.
